Peter the Rock Tribute to Bishop Peter Hall



Unlock London Walk Workshop 2015

Bishop Peter Hall

was a founder member of Unlock and a driving force in the establishment of the Unlock London walks as Unlock's primary fundraiser.

His death at the end of 2013 was a great loss and the 2015 Unlock London Walk was staged as a tribute to his life and work. The walk explored the parts of London where Peter had lived and worked when he was Bishop of Woolwich in the 1980s.

Below are two of the tributes to Peter's life, his work and his character which were published by Unlock in 2015.



Peter's early involvement with what led to Unlock

When the first precedents to Unlock were started, Peter was working in what is now Zimbabwe. He had kept in touch with a group of Evangelicals in UK, of whom David Sheppard was the best known. They had a concern that, especially in the estates of urban sprawl, the gospel should be shared, not in a "top -down" academic way, but taking account of the life experiences of ordinary people.

For Peter, his current experience was of bringing the "good news" to folk of a completely different culture. He felt this to be exactly parallel. I'll never forget his delight when he returned from calling in at the end of the parish African Bible study. He had found them studying the "scapegoat" that God had provided - and they were weeping with joy! They had had the same experience in their religion of sending a goat away to the wilderness to carry their sins! Now they heard that Jesus had "borne our sins". He is the Scapegoat. *They* could tell *us* how that felt! And the gospel was emerging as totally meaningful to its hearers - certainly not "top-down" academic!


When we returned to UK, in 1971, Peter quickly linked up with his friends. His patch was in a city church in the middle of Birmingham, so the "urban" bit of their thinking was very relevant to him. They carried their thinking through to the founding of ECUM and EUTP (Evangelical Urban Training Project) later to have a shorter name "Unlock". These were the days of the first Project Officer, Neville Black in Liverpool. Peter became Chairman of Unlock in 1982, and worked closely with Jim Hart, the second Project Officer. He retired from being Chair in 2002. *Jill Hall*

I had the huge honour of taking over as Chair of the Unlock national Council from Peter. That's a long time ago now, but throughout that time Peter and Jill have remained wonderfully supportive. Not a single iota of steering from the back seat, just tremendous love and practical commitment mainly through organising the walk, in Peter's case, to the last.

At Council we've talked a fair bit about Peter. These are the bones of what has stood out for us:

- enormous personal warmth and a great sense of humour and enjoyment of life;
- humility he didn't mind using his position or title if necessary but it was always clear he thought of himself no more highly that any one else;
- passion for the powerless-poor and a clear view that we need to see and address people's 'sinned-against-ness'.









'You are the Christ, the Son of the Living God'

Wash away sins - take a dark rock in your hand and think of a time when you have ignored what is right and failed to help someone in need or a regret that burdens you.

Use the chalk to write a name of someone you have failed or word that describes your sorrow and hold the rock as you seek God's forgiveness.

Now wash your rock clean in the water just as Jesus washed away our sins.

You can choose to either take your stones home with you or to place them at the cross to build a Kingdom roadway (see page 18).

Unlocking Life Experience

Hopefully people will have begun to share stories amongst themselves naturally as they look at the display. The activities below encourage them to take that further.

Revealing the down to earth Christ What Bible passage(s) will you have prepared? Remember Unlock's teaching method is learner centred - listen to the stories that people tell and be ready to use a Bible passage or account of God's work that relates to what they say.

Is there a creative way you can re-tell any of the Bible stories? (visual, dramatic, video clip, modernised etc)

The Unlock Learning Cycle

Unlocking real life stories of urban people. Start with the group telling stories from their real life experience.

Leading to more experience. What we learn now is

What we learn now is learnt for life and changes us. We also learn to keep reflecting!.

Releasing life changing skills and confidence.

Change happens as a result of linking real life experience with the Bible. This change often leads to action among <

Revealing Good News of the Down to Earth Christ. The real life stories are connected to and compared with similar situations in the Bible.



Unlock, by various names, has been around since 1972, trying to help (mainly) urban Christians to understand and share their faith appropriately. Our life experience matters; our stories; our joys and sorrows. The Bible has plenty to say, more than we'll ever know, about our lives, if we know how to read it and apply it if we know how to **UNLOCK** it!

The work outlined in this pack applies the learning cycle on page 24, **starting by using a** '**prompt'** to draw out group member's stories. In this case the suggested prompt is the slideshow about Bishop Peter Hall.

Usually in Unlock workshops we encourage participants to come up with their own Bible links but in the context of the walk workshop, when time is very limited, it is helpful to provide some. In this case we have used parts of the story of St Peter that we felt participants would be able to connect with the stories of Bishop Peter and with their own lives.

Finally there are suggestions for a range of **reflective activities**, (pages 16-20) giving people a choice of opportunities to reflect on the session and any action they might want to take as a result. The reflective activity creates space in which discussion and reflection can continue in an unforced way.

How well the group know and trust one another will affect the type of story that they share, often the newer the group, the more light hearted the stories are likely to be.



Unlock uses an approach to engaging with the Bible that is different to traditional Bible studies (see page 24). Unlock's approach usually starts from the stories and experiences of group members, or from their community, whereas a more traditional approach starts from the Biblical text. Unlock's approach has been found to work well with small groups of urban, oral learners from outside of the church. There are many free resources on the Unlock website designed for use with such groups. However, because each of these resources was designed for a particular group in a particular time and place they are unlikely be a perfect fit for your group as they stand. They are offered more as inspiration to you to design your own materials along the same lines, rather than as ready to use packages.

Unlock usually works with people outside of church who may be interested in finding out a bit more about faith but perhaps are not attracted to the formal methods of learning often associated with church. Our work is based on a reflective learning cycle and is a tried and tested way of introducing people to the Bible in a non-threatening way. Many churches have activities that draw in members of their surrounding community but then struggle with how to move on from those relationships into exploring faith, especially in urban environments where anything formal might be treated with suspicion.

This resource has been developed by a team of Unlock workers specifically for those who attended the 2015 Unlock London Walk.

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
