




This pack aims to give you some things to help you get under the surface of these images, with many of the activities based on Unlock's mission statement:



Unlocking real life stories of urban people. Revealing Good News of the down to Earth Christ. Releasing life changing skills and confidence.

How to use this pack

This is a pack of resources for you to use in the order that you feel suits your situation best.

It's something you can dip into, and use to help your group value their life experiences, discover fresh insights into the Bible - and choose to make changes in their own lives, affecting the lives of those around them. It is NOT a set course, where you start at the beginning, work through to the end, and expect everyone to learn the same thing!

The pack includes a game; some **Unlock** style Bible studies; some pages you could use as posters, discussion starters or place mats at a meal! You will need to think about your group, and make some decisions about what to do ... or think and plan with your group about their needs and priorities.

Unlock's theology and educational method.

Page 21 gives you some ideas of how you might continue, once you've tried the things in this pack. The rest of the pack is a "mixed bag" of resources. We hope you enjoy using them, and we'd love to hear from you what you've done - so we can pass on your good ideas to others.

know your group, accept them as

The keys to Unlock materials are:

- know your group, accept them as they are, and believe that everyone's experience and insights are valuable
- begin with everyday real life.
- be ready to listen and discover a new slant on familiar Bible passages.
- don't forget there are no "experts" we are all learning together.
- be flexible!



Unlock-more than you think page 2

A few ideas to get you started:

"I've never used an Unlock Bible study, and I want to have a go for the first time"

- Read page 4, "Unlock's method of Bible study", to give you some understanding of the approach. Contact the Unlock office if you'd like some more help.
- Use page 6. "The key in our hands" questions, to encourage the group to tell their stories of lost and found keys. (You might want to copy the sheet for each person. or make a large copy that everyone can see?). Then read page 7 together "The keys of the kingdom" Bible sheet. You might want to make copies for everyone, or you might prefer to have one or two volunteers read it and the rest listen. Ask people:

"What do your stories and the Bible story have in common?"

"What do your stories help you to understand about the keys of the kingdom?" and then "What difference will this make for you this week?"

Try to avoid one person becoming the expert, saying "Mine is the right interpretation of this passage, this is what we are supposed to think"

• or you could use pages 13 and 15, the "Doors and gates" questions and Bible sheet in the same way. Page 14 gives some extra notes for group leaders.

"I'd like us to think about life outside this group / church"

- Then try the domino game. "Unlocking the links", on pages 8 and 9 (you'll need to copy the dominoes onto card, and cut them up) and you could then go on to think about doors and gates
- look at page 12, the "Open Doors" story together you can copy it for everyone in the group
- talk about the doors of your own church you might want to go outside, and look at the doors. trying to imagine what they'd be like for someone outside
- look at the questions about "church" on page 13, "Doors and gates"
- look together the Bible passage "The Gate", and think about the doors and gates of your church - are they like Jesus?
- You might like to go to different doors and gates in your church premises to pray - for those who come in and out, and for the possibilities through the door.
- Think together about whether there is anything practical you want to do.

"What could we do with pages 16-20?"

- photocopy them onto A3 sheets or larger, and use them as posters.
- photocopy them onto coloured paper, for table mats at a group or church meal.
- photocopy 'Who will go through the Open Door" on white. and it's a colouring sheet for children.
- Use the guestions as discussion starters in a group or over a meal

"It's all the same people who do everything. What stops the others?"

Trespassers will not be prosecuted. pages 10 and 11, is a plan for an activity day (a different style church away day?) that encourages people to represent the barriers to their involvement in creative ways - and then break through..

Who is locked into this church and its activities? Who do we lock out?

What are the "right keys" for you to help grow in your faith?

....find the questions that will make sense for the group, and then make links with the Bible.



The traditional method of Bible study

The majority of bible studies start with a text

"There was once a man.."

And move onto an analysis of the text and the deduction of general principles.

"The good Samaritan helped his neighbour..."

Finally, there is encouragement to apply this to life


"We must help others."

This style provides a framework, within which the person can store the information in his/her mind, in note form, or on disc, for retrieval when it is needed. This requires a way of thinking and communicating which is based on book and lecture methods of learning; it is not the appropriate method for a vast number of people.

Unlocking real life stories of urban people


Unlock's methods begin with a group of people sharing their real life experiences. Unlock's materials suggest different things that will help this to happen - for example, a few questions, a game or a video clip.



Revealing Good News of the Down to Earth Christ

These real life stories are compared with similar situations in the Bible.

Unlock materials provide Bible passages on individual pages, that can be photocopied for use with a group.



Change happens as a result of linking real life experiences with the Bible -

"We learn it now and we learn it for life."

The individuals and groups involved change, and there is often action among those around them.







THE KEYS OF THE KINGDOM

When Jesus arrived in the villages of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "What are people saying about who the Son of Man is?"

They replied, "Some think he is John the Baptizer, some say Elijah. some Jeremiah or one of the other prophets."


expansive with energy that not even the gates of hell will be able to keep it Out."

Unlocking the links

This game, based on dominoes, is to help a group - or a whole church - recognise the relationships that already exist between the church and people in the neighbourhood. It's been tried and tested in "all age" settings. and children are able to play it alongside adults.

You will need

- to make the dominoes, using the original in the pack. You could photocopy onto card, or coloured paper, and then cut them.
- Allow at least 2 dominoes per person.
- enough felt pens / pencils etc for everyone plenty of colours if people like to enjoy the creative bit.
- to make a starter card a "Double church" or "Double home group" or whatever you are starting from.



Give out 2 dominoes per person

Ask members of the group to think about "Where do you meet people?"

Ask people to draw or write (1 or 2 words only) their responses, two per domino

For example



Begin with the double church, ask if anyone has church on one of their cards These cards are laid, and the domino game continues eg matching "shops", "bus stop" etc.

(If you need to, you can bend the domino rules, and have several cards meeting one.)

Revealing Good News of the Down to Earth Christ

The idea of this part is that people in your group or church help each other remember Bible stories. Get your Bibles out if you must, to check details, but you may find it works best with people sharing what they remember.

Where did Jesus meet people?

Who did Jesus meet? What sort of people were they?

What happened as a result of people meeting Jesus?

(Don't forget to congratulate your group on the amount of shared Bible knowledge they have)

Now compare the dominoes with Jesus meeting with people

What's the same? What's different?



TRESPASSERS WILL NOT BE PROSECUTED

An activity to use with your church or your group It's based on events created by Unlock workers in Hull. You'll need either a Saturday, or 2 evenings.

What's the aim? It's to help people explore what stops them gaining access to God's family, church leadership ... and God's presence!

Where can we do this? If you're in a church with a separate holy' area at the front, then get permission to use that. Otherwise you'll need to identify part of the church that is seen as inaccessible to the "rank and

What will we need? A large curtain, and a variety of creative stuff - paper, pens, pins etc.

So, what do we do?

Set up a "curtain" to represent the barrier that needs to be broken through.

The next part works best in small(ish) groups, so if you're more than about 6 people, you might want to divide into subgroups.

Part 1:" What does the curtain mean?"

Ask people what stops them

- being in God's presence?being part of God's family?
- -doing things to help lead the church?

Ask them to think about the barriers in themselves and the barriers put up by others

Then, find ways to represent the barriers! Write or draw on paper ... or can you think of something else?! Then pin or stick these to the curtain.

Part 2: "Breaking through"

Read "Freak Earthquake Hits Jerusalem" (from page 11). Then, again in small groups, think about what needs to happen to yourself and to the church to gain access through the barriers. Find a way to represent this:

- write a prayer, or a poem
- write a rap or a "football chant"
- create a mime or a drama
- create something 'visual' a large scale cartoon, something 3D made from 'junk', patterns from ordinary objects on an OHP.
- your imagination is the limit!

The groups come back together, and present their "breakthrough". Then, pull the curtain down, and enjoy the fact that the barrier is removed. To add to the celebration, you may like to follow the example of the Hull group. Someone had secretly prepared a 'banquet table', and provided a feast of fish and chips, waiting for those who had come through the Curtain!

This activity requires a leader(s) with some flexibility and ability, to not only be creative themselves, but also draw out the creativity of others.

Great Adventure Ends In Death

Freak Earthquake Hits Jerusalem Temple Curtain Goes For A Burton

Curtain

Open Doors! True Story

Maureens vision

A Café in a local parade of shops, to reach out with the Gospel and give practical help to the many young people living in the area.

Maureen saw other projects come and go. The café vision was a dream, a hop, a memory, for more than 10 years but seemed to be from God.

But the vision would not go away.

Eventually Maureen asked friends from her multi cultural inner-city congregation to meet and pray and discuss the vision.

How does God want to reach out from the church into the surrounding community?

A small group met to pray and think about taking over an unused shop, on the main street....but we didn't! What was God saying to us? As our group grew larger we moved from a home to a room into a room at the church, located on the corner of a main road and a side street. And we realised we had a building of our own to use! We prayed and dreamed about what God might want to do! Lots of excitement and ideas but not much happened! What did God want us to do?

A bridge between church and community, for good news to go out, and for people to come inbringing the neighbourhood into contact with our spiritual life!

A piece of quiet for Christmas

As Christmas drew near, we thought how for some it is a painful time of year. We would pro-

vide space for people to drop in, or just be still. We offered a drink and a listening ear, on Monday mornings.

Doors open!!

Then we set to work. The main doors to the church are large, forbidding and usually closed. And the church garden wasn't much better!!


One Monday morning, we met to pray and then threw open the great doors onto a cold sunlit street and started gardening. We couldn't get on with the work as people came up and spoke to us.

"Is that a church? Is it open?"

"I've never seen it open before, I thought it was closed."

"I'm glad to see it open again."

I had more conversations about God on Monday, than I ever had going to church on a Sunday.





In the 15 months since that pilot project, we have seen other initiatives take root and grow. But it was our little quiet space that first unlocked the doors and made us visible.



Doors and Gates



Home

- You get home after a hard day, and you're glad to be indoors. You shut the door, put the kettle on, and sit down and relax. How do you feel?
- In what ways is your home a safe and secure place? Take a large piece of paper and write down or draw some ideas from the group.
- Has your safety ever been violated and you've felt threatened? e.g. unwanted callers
 at the door, a burglary, or maybe a member of your family who has frightened you

Church

- Does church feel like a safe place? What feels safe about it?
- Write down or draw some ideas on how you have found the church to be a sanctuary from the world outside.



Now read the bible story "THE GATE"

- What links can you see between your stories about home and church and Jesus' picture of himself as the door?
- Where are you safe?
- Where do you go out to find what you need?
- Who are the doorkeepers in these places-who decides who is on the inside and who gets left out?
- What changes would you like to see-in your home, in your church, in yourself?

Doors and gates- notes for group leaders

Part A: Inside

- 1) Ask the group the questions about 'home'. This needs quite a lot of trust in the group. If your group is fairly new, you might like to leave this part until they know each other a bit more.
- 2) Ask the group the questions about 'church'. You might like to begin with an explanation: If you go to an old church you will find it usually has a very heavy solid wooden door that weighs a ton.. They were built like this deliberately to make them safe from thieves and bandits who might try to get in. And you could go and find sanctuary in a church with the door firmly shut it was a place of safely from those who were out to get you.

NB You can give group members the question sheet if you want to

3) Ask the group to look at their two lists

What is the same?

What is different?

Why?

Part B: Outside

"We've been thinking about what it's like on the inside with the door closed Now we're going to think about being on the outside."

One member of the group needs to volunteer to be on the outside. The rest of the group get into a small tight circle and start a conversation, and make sure that the person on the outside can't get in. The person on the outside should try to interrupt and get a word in, but the group mustn't let them in.

Find out from the person on the outside what it felt like.

Why do we close doors?

What helps us open them?

Have you ever been on the outside with the door closed?

Finish by praying, either aloud or in silence, for each person in your group, and for the places you have been talking about, churches, homes, places of work.



The Gate

So Jesus said again.


"I am telling you the truth: I am the gate for the sheep. All others who came before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not listen to them.

John Chapter 10 v7-10 Good News Bible


The sheepfold was a safe space, surrounded by a wall with a gap. The sheep could go in at night and be safe from the wolves, lions and thieves who might harm or steal them. The sheepherd used to sleep across the doorway - 'the gate". The sheep had to go out of the fold during the day, because outside was where the food was - the grass that kept them alive.










