

ISLE OF DOGS.
Marshes and windmills, and possibly named after Royal Kennels. West India Docks developed between 1799 and 1802 and were closed in the 1970's when all London's shipping was concentrated at Tilbury. The land is being redeveloped by the Dockland Development Corporation but many of the huge water-areas remain.

GREENWICH.
A HISTORIC TOWN WITH AN IMPRESSIVE CENTRE, NOW ENCLAVED IN THE SUBURBS. THE PARISH CHURCH, ALTHOUGH MOSTLY OF 17th CENTURY, CONTAINS OLDER FOUNDATIONS. THE ROYAL NAVAL COLLEGE WAS CALLED 'GREENWICH PALACE' AND WAS BUILT BETWEEN 1616 AND 1811. THE NATIONAL MARITIME MUSEUM DATES FROM 1910-1937. THE 'GUTTY SARK' WAS LAUNCHED IN 1869 AND CARRIED TEA AND WOOL. IT WAS USED UNTIL 1922.

cont. - IN 1698, DEPTFORD WAS A TOWN BEFORE IT BECAME A SUBURB AND 'INNER AREA', IT IS TODAY.

DEPTFORD. THIS WAS A SMALL FISHING VILLAGE WHEN HENRY VIII STARTED HIS 'KINGS SHIPYARD' THERE. THE EMPEROR OF RUSSIA, PETER THE GREAT WORKED AS A SHIPWRIGHT HERE.

- ⑥ Surrey Canal. Built in 1803. Closed and filled-in during the 1960's.
- ⑦ "John Evelyn" Public House, Evelyn Street, Sayes Court, all commemorated the famous diarist who lived here at Sayes Court.
- ⑧ Albany Street. An original 18th century street.
- ⑨ St. Paul's Church. Designed by Thomas Archer, and built 1712-1730. It is north a detour off the route to see this.

- ① St. James' Church. By Savage, 1827-1829.
- ② Jamaica Road, named after a wealthy merchant trading in the West Indies.
- ③ Brunel Road, named after Isambard Kingdom Brunel who designed the railway tunnel below. This took form 1825-1843 to build.
- ④ Rotherhithe Tunnel. Opened in 1908.
- ⑤ Pepsy's Estate. Named after Samuel Pepsy, who died 1703. He danced and friend of John Evelyn.

ROTHERHITHE, NORTHERN BERMUNDSEY AND
UP BY 1700. THE OLD HOUSES WERE REPLACED BY 19th-CENTURY TERRACES AND TENEMENT BLOCKS CALLED 'MODEL DWELLINGS'. DURING THE LAST TWENTY YEARS THE COURTS HAVE CLEARED MOST OF THE OLD HOUSES AND BUILT TOWER-BLOCKS, MAISONNETTES AND HOUSES. ON YOUR WALK YOU WILL STILL SEE EXAMPLES OF HOUSES FROM THE 18th. AND 19th. CENTURIES.
