The 16th Eutp walk includes two major milestones in urban history. Clapham Junction has come to symbolise the railway network. It was the construction of the railways which created South London and many of today's big urban areas. The Clapham 'sect' worshipping at Holy Trinity on the Common, was hugely effective in attacking injustice and inhumanity. Faced by many living in urban areas and was instrumental in getting the slave trade banned. Both were agents for change - one technological, the other Christian and with a vision for justice.

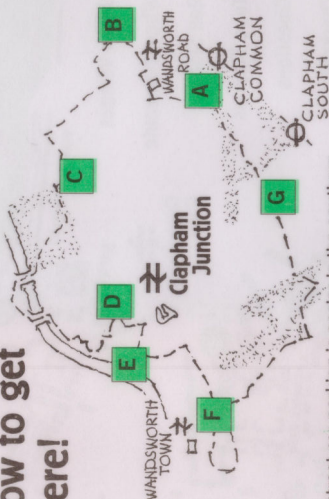
