CHAIR'S ANNUAL REPO

Dear Supporter,

Welcome back to Unlock! We've been away for a while, so perhaps it's more a case of some of you welcoming Unlock back - I hope so. There was no Annual Report in 2003. Peter Hall's 'stop press' at the end of his 2002 chair's report was that Jenny Richardson, the chief officer, was leaving. In his report he said that he would be handing over the chair during 2003. The next year or so was going to be 'interesting' if only for these reasons.

Jenny, with great wisdom, suggested a thorough review when she left. Six months later we were considering Greg Smith's 'root and branch' report at a Council meeting during which Peter handed the role of chairing the National Council to me.

Who is he?

Allow me a slight digression, since Unlock doesn't get a new chair often. Peter Hall did the job for 20 years. I am a C.of E. Social Responsibility Officer in Hull and have been involved with EUTP/Unlock for over ten years now.

We have done some 'creative' stuff in Hull with quite a well developed group of us over the years, although we are a bit fallow at present. I was also on Jenny's creative 'think tank' (helping with strategy) for as long as she had it. I am also chair of some other groups and have a lot of experience of running voluntary and community based organisations.

Getting radical.....

Whilst Unlock had not departed from its roots (which the term 'getting radical' might imply) we certainly decided on some serious re-ordering of how we go about our work and the way we spend money.

By October 2003 we agreed that we needed to replace Jenny and David (our finance officer who left in May 2002) with one person whilst 'contracting out' certain technical roles. Carol and Lois would have different roles in the office, whilst our unique resources would be available on our wbesite for free! Unlock would move to a new style of development work.

'Corner Shops?'

One or two people have found this analogy confusing I will attempt to explain: Historically the way that Unlock has worked has been a bit like a large central resource and distribution centre where the the rest of the report. vast majority of the knowledge, resources, power and £'s spent has been focussed.

We want to engage in a redistribution and our vision is that corner shops will be small but solid local groups with someone paid one day per week to work for Unlock. We will support such developments to the tune

of £2000 if the local group can raise that or more locally. We will also pile in all our support and development energy to these 'corner shops' where the real face-to-face work of enabling people to connect their life with their faith and then share that connection with others will happen.

We truly think that we have hit a rich seam! Thank you for your prayers for our work. Our Glasgow team is now up and running and we welcomed Anne Craig in September 2004. Our budget allows us to develop maybe two more corner shops this coming year, and we have already got four areas who are exploring the possibility.

Finding a new Chief Officer: I've raced ahead. With no suitable applicants following our first advert for this role, we set about winkling the right person out. Dawn Lonsdale is that right person and just about her first big job was to go to Glasgow and interview Anne!

Dawn started in July and has very quickly gained the confidence of us all.

Carol and Lois have had to be extremely adaptable over these last two years; they have weathered a great deal of change that is still happening.

I am so grateful to them and also to Jenny Blake, our Treasurer who lives in Sheffield, who has kept close and supportive touch with the office.

Back and ready for action.....

Well, we were never away, but thank you for staying with us. This is going to be an exciting year for Unlock, if rather less nail biting we hope.

Lots of people are talking about 'fresh expressions' or 'new ways of being church'. We've got the structure and the people, and new corner shops coming, so that we can 'unlock real life stories... reveal good news....release life changing skills and confidence!

Without this process, there won't be too many 'fresh expressions' in the cities which are our main business, and they certainly won't have any local leadership to sustain them.
