"I think it is safe to say that 2008/9 has been a very good year indeed for Unlock. I said last year that the strategy we had followed for the previous five years was finally bearing considerable fruit. Well it was and it is. We have a clutch of new places where Dawn is looking to develop what we have elsewhere: part time workers engaging in lots of very fascinating, challenging, good newsface to face work in four cities; Glasgow, Sheffield, Liverpool and Birmingham, with continuing 'informal' activity in Hull. Much of that work is maturing rapidly and there are, for example, some excellent resources available on website as a result. Please have a look, they are free; try them out. However, we don't exist to produce resources; we aren't the experts, just the purveyors of a method which says, if you want to communicate something...or in our case, someone, Jesus.... to people

and they can't understand you, then you have got a problem..... If God in Jesus was prepared to move into the neighbourhood and communicate as the ordinary people of that culture and day did, so MUST we. Its not rocket science. Despite this seemingly divided reaction, the time eating what we have cooked actually provides a space for reflective discussion and eating the food means that more dominant chatty participants make room for others to talk! So as we chewed it over (sorry!) it became clear it was the first time that any of the group had made the connection that Jesus was taking the blame for them.

Cooking The Book

A Bible overview with a difference! Each week a recipe provides the framework as participants explore their life experience and connect them with God's story.

- 1. Something from Nothing (Creation)
- 2. Tricky (The Fall)

Restoring The City; Bricks, Building, and Big Hearts

An activity to encourage participants to connect issues facing them, or their community, with the story of Nehemiah by reflecting on a series of questions as they build a wall using card bricks they have made themselves.

From Unlock Glasgow

"Building, bricks and big hearts" took place at St Gregory's RC Church Wyndford on 28th March, when we looked at how Nehemiah got the community together to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem.

The resources for this event were developed in teamwork with Sonya who works for Unlock in Liverpool, and also in teamwork with Graham Mackie who lives in the Wyndford, and who shared the leadership both in the planning and at the event.

The schools closures is a big issue in the

Wyndford and that was explored at the Unlock event. Over Easter the local churches decided to re-route their annual Walk with the Cross to pass the schools. Both Church of Scotland minister and Catholic priest said a few words and joined in prayer in front of the schools. Because of this support many of the local community joined the Walk and went together to the Good Friday service afterwards. Some of the parents who were "sitting in" at the schools were in tears, they were so moved that the churches were acting together to support them.

Unlock appointed Sonya Doragh as Liverpool Urban Discipleship Development worker in April 2008 for a period of two years for 18 hours a week.

Following an initial series of placements, the first phase of the post involved using Unlock's methodology in the Anfield area. Unlock uses a participant centred approach to Bible engagement with a focus on urban culture, especially appropriate for non-book, or oral learners. Unlock develops materials to fit the groups it works with so Sonya has created each session that has been delivered following the Unlock reflective theological cycle:

Unlocking real life stories of urban people

Start with the group telling stories from their real life experience.

Leading to more experience What we learn now is learnt

Cooking the Book

Revealing Good News of the Down to Earth Christ

The real life stories are compared with similar situations in the Bible.

Not only do participants learn from the content and reflection during sessions, but the hope is that they will engage in a similar reflective process in their daily lives, hopefully seeking God in the everyday things of life.

Releasing life changing skills

Change happens as a result of

linking real life experience with

the Bible. This change often

leads to action among others.

Those that participated in 'Cooking the Book' were all unemployed, unchurched and unfamiliar with the Bible, but connected with Christ Church through a weekly community meal, this moment from the programme is one of many showing how this approach works:

After putting the soup on to simmer, I asked, 'Have you ever made something that you are proud of?' The responses were quite amazing, including re-upholstering a 3 piece suite and carving book ends that are still used some 20 years on. 'How did you feel?' ''Kinda too big on the inside, like there wasn't enough room for how pleased I was and I might burst.' We went through a pictorial account of the creation story. Finishing by saying that when God made all those things and when he made each of us, He thought it was good, He probably had the same feelings you did when you were pleased with what you made'... there was a moments silence, one of those holy feeling pauses, then, 'That's boss, that is. God thinks I'm alright.' 'Cooking the Book' 'Mess Mistakes and Muddling through' a course using parenting themes from the 'Staying for Lunch' group and Nehemiah materials have been published on Unlock's website.

The next phase of the project is to promote and enable the use of Unlock's methodology throughout the diocese and to promote the need to consider non-book learners. A programme, called Unlock DIY has started whereby Sonya is supporting participants as they develop their own materials based on the Unlock learning cycle and then use them with a group in their own area. The DIY programme will run as a one day event on 9th February 2010. An Unlock style Baptism Preparation Tool Kit is also being developed.

Meet the Walk Planning Team

He remains actively involved in the work of one of the teacher Unions, ATL. He has also worked as a computer programmer and a bus driver.

Geoff is a member of the Association of Christian Teachers, serving as Trustee and Treasurer. His other interests include steam trains and travel. He has particular links with Brazil, where at one time he taught in a school for missionaries' children, and Bangladesh, which he visits frequently. He has a large number of Muslim friends amongst the UK Bangladeshi community, some of whom have in the past joined him for the London Walk.

He is a member of an 'estate' Anglican church, St. Andrew's, Sidcup, singing in the music group, leading a house group, and serving on the PCC. Jill and Peter Hall

Peter and Jill live in Birmingham, in theory retired, after working in south London for 12 years. Peter was Bishop of Woolwich, and Jill was teaching adults, mainly asylum seekers, with whom she has worked ever since. Previously they had lived in Birmingham twice, before and after ten years in Zimbabwe (then Rhodesia).

Peter connected with EUTP in its early formative days, and was chairman of the National Council for 20 years, when it was served by Jim Hart and then by Jenny Richardson. Jill joined the Council and duly became the drawer of the map for the Walk. They design the route, find the churches willing to be the checkpoints, the map is drawn and others check it and fill it with photos and information.

Unlock Finance

A year of new beginnings

Following last year's slight surplus, it is with great thankfulness that we can report a considerable increase in turnover in 2008, as well as an excess of £8.762 income over expenditure. Of this £2,500 is earmarked funding for the ongoing work in Liverpool & Sheffield, but the rest is largely due to generous trust donations, including Trust Greenbelt's sponsoring of the annual Unlock workers festival. This created a wonderful opportunity for staff, workers, council members and some support group members to meet together overnight at Bawtry Hall, Doncaster. These donations more than compensated for the fall of 10% in walk income which followed a record year the previous year, but was still well above average. For the first time donations, including £10,500 direct sponsorship for the ongoing work in Hull together with new projects in Liverpool & Sheffield,



exceeded walk income and we are on course for workers in Birmingham in 2009 as the Hull project comes to an end.

Another significant part of our income is almost £5,000 in Gift Aid which is a tremendous help at no cost to individuals who are able to give in this way. We have benefited as expected from the lower costs following the office move and this has been appreciated by all, as well as the replacement of an old computer and printer during the year.

All in all, a good year, thanks once again to your generous support which is very encouraging and we look forward with expectation to the coming year and all the opportunities it holds. Please do continue to support us both financially and prayerfully, and see if you can benefit from the resources on the website. I would particularly commend one of our newest resources, The Crucible bible studies, having investigated them for use in group work myself. Any contribution you are able to make towards the cost of these resources is always very much appreciated.

Thank you once again to all who shared in the sponsored walk or gave in many other ways in 2008, and please do continue.

iftaid it but what is giftaid?

Simply, for those of you who have not yet heard of 'Gift aid', it is a system that enables charities to claim an extra 28p from the Inland Revenue for every £1 donated to them by a UK taxpayer.

9 in every 10 donations received by Unlock are NOT made under gift-aid.

If you pay tax then please consider whether you can tick the gift-aid box on the registration form when you make your donation.

Gift aid will not cost YOU anything!

All it means is that we can apply to the Inland Revenue for an extra 28p for every £1 that you give towards our work.


To qualify for Gift aid, you must pay enough tax to cover the amount that will claimed back by the charity/charities that you give to - so if you give £10 you must have paid £2.80 in tax!

Unlock some money – will you donate to secure the future of Unlock's work?

We have a serious deficit in 2009 that means we can't continue in 2010 without some major cuts. The reality is that we are already such a tiny outfit that there is really nothing we can cut without it having a serious impact on our frontline work, which is at such an exciting stage, as you can see from the stories of Unlock work scattered throughout this annual report. 2009 walk sponsorship and donations have only reached £22,000. It was a great walk and there were plenty of

people on it, but income is down £3,500 on 2008 and over £6,000 on 2007. Unlock relies heavily on income from the Unlock London walk to fund our work. We've been trying hard but it is very difficult to secure other types of funding, because we are directly engaged in Christian Mission. If you are a supporter who could help us financially, or if you are a walker who has not yet sent in your sponsor money, or are able to give a little bit more to support Unlock's work, please do

so. Unlock local projects are achieving great things, bringing the gospel to people that the churches haven't been able to reach; and we have more on the way! But we do urgently need your financial support in order to go on doing that. If you are able to do that regularly by standing order, and gift aid it, that's great, but we are a widow's mite type of organisation and every little helps. And pray anyway; we need some financial unlocking. Thank you.



Unlock Birmingham had its Launch on 27th July at St. Mary's, Pype Hayes. It was well attended with people from the Baptist Church, Church of England and the MethodistChurches.Therewerecommunity project workers and trainers also, as well as lay and ordained people who attended. We prepared for the launch by re-walking around the significant landmarks of the city. These included the Bullring, tower blocks, Spaghetti Junction and Cadbury in Bournville. The image that spoke to us as we thought about the potential of Unlock, was the scene we faced as we walked around the canal paths around the waterways in the city. The traditional 'locks' reminded us that Unlock is all about helping the good news of the down to earth Christ to flow to all directions, particularly to those in the challenging urban areas, that are hidden away from the glamour of the stylish shopping centres and contemporary canal side apartments and offices.

From Mess, Mistakes and Muddling Through

Our first session looked at the theme, 'Even Good Parents Make Mistakes'. Starting from a picture of a very lonely looking girl we shared stories, of course we all had plenty of personal experience to draw on! I then 'told' the story of Mary and Joseph losing Jesus on the way back from Jerusalem. At our following meeting one of the girls was really animated when I asked, 'Has anything from the last session made a difference to you over the last fortnight?' 'Yes, yes! It was amazing, right, we was in town and me mate lost her kid, only for a few minutes like but while he was lost we bumped into her mam and her mam was furious, yelling at her and that. And I thought, that's a bit harsh, she's only made a mistake. Then we found the kid but her mam were still going on and I remembered what had happened to Mary, so I told her if it was good enough for Jesus to have a human mam that made mistakes then surely it's good enough for anyone!'



From Unlock Sheffield

Over the past year a number of people have commented that the use of songs, Christian, folk, pop, rock etc can be good starters in the process of storytelling. The stories of individuals and communities are key in our Unlock way of doing things. Ray Hearne, a local (Rotherham area) poet, storyteller, folk singer, community development worker, uses his songs in a very powerful way and one example of this is Yorkshire Colliery - to the tune of "To be a pilgrim". Westlife's "You raise me up" is one that can make a connection with the Easter Story. Snippets from films even if they aren't that new can also make connections.

In my use of the Crucible resource - the picture of being on the scrap heap certainly had a powerful effect on one lady in one of the sessions. She said that she's always

felt surplus to requirements and a waste of space and the gradual development of the study helped her understand that the "scrap heap" experiences can and do lead to change and transformation.

During a teaching session at Wilson Carlile (Church Army) College in Sheffield, someone commented that Unlock's methods are just for the marginalized of the urban and estate situations. It made me think that this may be a general (although mistaken) perception. It challenged me to look at ways in which that perception may be changed. A book by Ann Morisy entitled

'Bothered and Bewildered' could be helpful to us in changing the perception. In the Treatise (an introduction) she writes - "The relevance and transformational power of our Christian faith, especially in troubled times (which we are in), make it urgent to build a church which enables people to engage with the coaching that Jesus gives in how to live, rather than emphasising 'hard to believe' formulaic faith."
