CHAIR'S REPORT 2021

Since you are reading this, you'll probably be reading some of the good news on the following pages; and the other good news is, YOU are still with us. These have been extremely difficult years for many people, and I'm very aware that very many of our supporters are, shall we say, not in the first or even second flush of youth; many of you have been with us since EUTP, so for a few decades now. So may I say, if you have suffered loss, or losses, my condolences; and if those losses, or 'just' the isolation and loneliness our response to the virus has engendered have affected you, we extend our love all-be-it in this very impersonal way. Some of us around Unlock have talked about all this quite a lot and the resource you've read about, 'The Year we Stayed at Home' might help. If any band of people should know something about the prime importance of overcoming fear and worry, it's us followers of the Jesus whose favourite phrase was, do not be afraid. In his spirit, let us pray together for our neighbours, country and world.

So, it would have been good to be able to say that 2021 had been so much better than 2020, but as we all know we have lost much of this year to Covid too; and the longer it went on, the harder it seemed to be to predict when it would end, or more significantly - since actually, it won't - when we all would be willing to re-engage.

We attempted a second 'virtual walk' in 2021. Indeed with thanks to 'the walk team' and especially Ian Smith, it happened; but in

terms of fundraising, very much less was raised. We are now able to hold the long delayed 'Gathering' of all the staff, local workers and trustees which is an

The Job Retention Scheme saved some of our bacon, but the

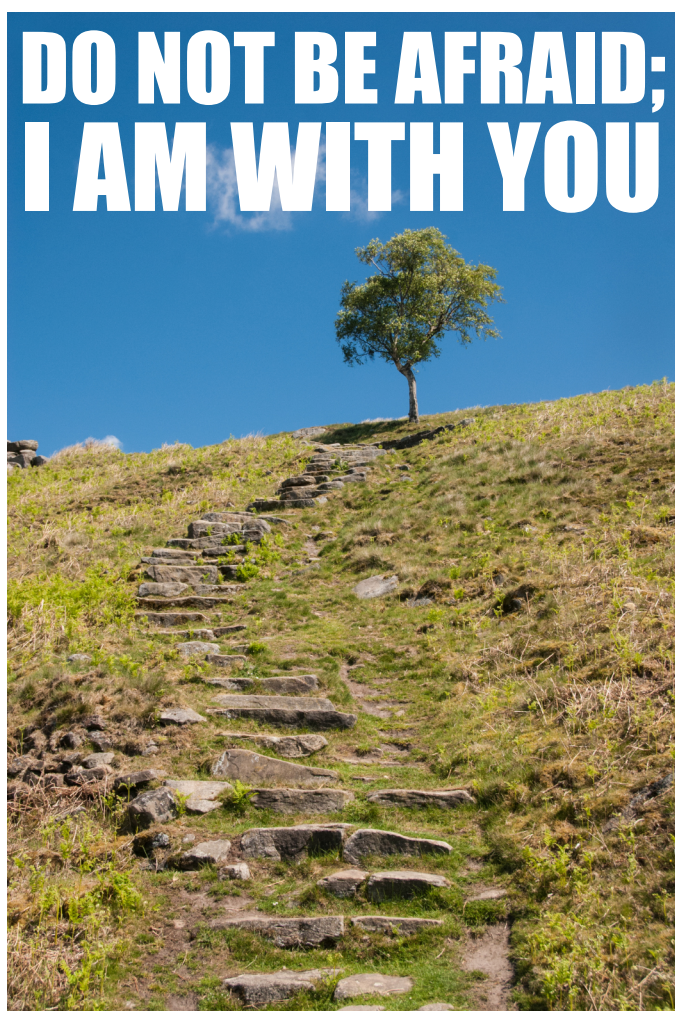

We will sit with that, not rush through it; and then we must also discern the import of what we've all been through and where that leaves the communities of places and people that we work in ... and then what we do about that. We developed as I've mentioned some great resources and revamped others - something that can be done at home; but how, now, to 'get back out there' (and how to pay for it of course)?

By the time you read this, we'll have had that time, but the working it all out will happen in 2022 so please continue to pray for the Dawn, Jenny and Kevin, for the 'walk team', for the remaining Unlock local workers and for some new or re-emerging places for us to work, and for us Trustees.

Local Work

On page 7 you will be able to see how relational connections and work have been sustained in our local partnership projects during the pandemic. We paused our development of work in Birmingham and will pick that up again shortly. Work in Sunderland and Treeton is currently being re-shaped and will emerge refreshed. We are beginning to look for some **new locations** for Unlock Local Partnership Projects. If you feel that your neighbourhood would benefit from a part time Unlock worker to enable local people in sharing the gospel in their communities, and to bring Unlock skills, advice, support, training materials and approaches, please do get in touch.

Unlock Training

We began a new campaign of Unlock training events around the country at the end of 2019. The ones we had chance to deliver were really well received.

Our life experience matters, our stories, our joys and sorrows. The Bible has plenty to say – more than we'll ever know – about our lives if we know how to read it and apply it; to 'Unlock' it. For many people, especially those in urban communities, hearing about Unlock's approach to Bible engagement brings a eureka moment as they discover a way forward with a fringe group that doesn't relate to traditional Bible studies or formal church meetings. We will pick up delivery of Unlock training events again as soon as there is demand, so if you

know anyone who would be interested in gaining the knowledge and confidence to apply this approach to their own local community and to share it with others, please encourage them to contact the Unlock office and we will design an event to meet their local needs.

Bible Reflection and Activity Resources

The things that emerged through the gaps created were some new resources. Our resource packs are not usually our primary focus but this last year or so has created an opportunity to give them a bit more attention, so now we have some new materials to offer (see back page for full details). On the whole Unlock's resource packs are designed for specific groups of people in specific times and places. We make them available free on our website unlock-urban.org.uk/resources_projects.php#bible_study_resources to encourage people to try out our approach, see how it works and then develop their own materials for their local context. But for once the whole country was dealing with the same set of significant challenges and although that has affected different people and places in different ways, at the emotional level there is much that we have all had to manage in common during the Pandemic. We have used that common ground on which to create our latest resource packs. These include the Unlock Covid Timeline, a graphic tool enabling people to reflect back on the last year or two and record their significant moments (prints of this are available from the Unlock Office for a donation to cover p&p). We hope all these materials will be useful as communities emerge and begin to recover from the impact of Covid.

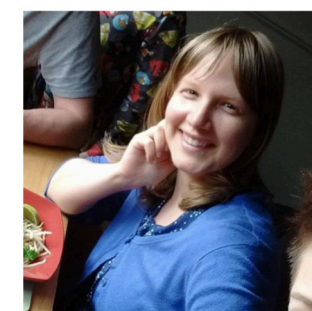

It is 2019 in Hull and Cathy is designing and delivering a series of Unlock sessions on feelings. Together with her local group she explores: anger, anxiety, peace, happiness, playfulness and sadness over several weeks. They share their own stories and connect them with stories from the Bible. Cathy's work is later developed into a new Unlock resource 'Unlocking Feelings' (see back page). Cathy received Unlock training at an event in Hull in 2018.

It is December 2020 in Sunderland and, with the assistance of Lydia, a local volunteer, Unlock worker Francesca Walsh is playing

Santa on Town End Farm estate. They are delivering Christmas gift bags to all of the children who would usually have been coming along to Unlock activities at St Bede's centre during the year. This is an opportunity to do something that was simply generous and to show people that they are remembered and appreciated even when it is not possible to meet together.

It is February (and March and April and May!) in Rotherham and Carolyn is working away at her desk. Recovering from Covid herself, she is developing materials to help people reflect on the mixed and demanding

experiences of Covid times; materials that will be included in the 2021 Unlock Virtual Walk, an Unlock recovery resource – 'The Year We Stayed at Home' (see back page) and also in local reflection and activity packs to be distributed within the local community. One person responded saying that the pack is "really good and encouraging" and that she feels like "going to the side of the river to read it from there where it's so quiet." Another plans to work through it with her husband who does not engage with church.

It is spring and summer 2020 and Sharon is keeping in touch with the women she has been working with in Cardiff via regular phone calls, posts of encouragements and messages in a private social media group and also by sending lovely cards to them. Each month she is sending out small gifts and tailor made Unlock reflection/activity packs to all the women. When Covid restrictions and the Welsh weather permit she and her volunteers are meeting one to one with them at outdoor cafes and for walks in parks.

It is wintertime in Cardiff and Sharon has arranged a Christmas get together. In order to manage distancing the event is run twice for two smaller groups. It includes food, a quiz and Christmas gifts and treats ensuring that the women continue to feel valued and cared for.

It is summer 2021 in Cardiff and, after bringing the women together for a picnic in May, Sharon is using the lament session from 'The Year We Stayed at Home' with them. This will be followed by a simple 'afternoon tea' as a treat. One of the women has had a massive shift in mental attitude around her illnesses and her mental health. She tells Sharon that she now believes that she isn't her mental health problems, she is more than that and they don't define her.



LONDON WALK

HERE WE GO AGAIN!

39TH UNLOCK LONDON WALK SATURDAY 23 APRIL 2022

It's possible you came on the 3rd Unlock Walk 35 years ago (!) in 1986 or the 27th in 2010, to visit Tower Hamlets. Maybe you came in 2016 to the Olympic Park, or maybe you joined us online for the Armchair (virtual) version during the 2020 Lockdown! But we hope that has all just whetted your appetite and you will want to join us for real (again or for the first time) in 2022 and you will find more fascinating contrasts between the past and the present, between stereotypes and reality. This is London's East End: inner-city rather than suburban.

The London Borough of Tower Hamlets only came into being in 1965, a merger of the former metropolitan boroughs of Bethnal Green, Poplar and Stepney. But the name is much older: the first written mention in 1554 was a catch-all description of the settlements north and east of the Tower of London (individual entry to which now costs £30!)



Remember Whitechapel on the Monopoly board costing £60? There's no cheap property any longer: a flat that cost £50,000 thirty years ago can now sell for seven times that much! Poverty remains. If you only think of Jack the Ripper or the Kray twins in connection with the East End, find out more about the radicals and

reformers like the Booths and Barnardo as well as the rogues. For anyone interested in historic buildings, this walk offers a huge selection including the magnificent Hawksmoor Christ Church, Spitalfields. If the history of housing appeals, you will want to see Arnold Circus on the Boundary Estate. For the nature-lover, the route will be along the Regent's Canal and across the Green Bridge at Mile End.

Having provided refuge for Protestant French Huguenots in the late 1700s and to persecuted Jews in the late 1800s, Tower Hamlets now has a population which is one third Bangladeshi Muslim in origin. You can buy both bagels and curry in Brick Lane! 38% of the borough's residents are Muslim – the highest proportion in the UK. You can visit a place of worship which has been a Huguenot Chapel, a synagogue and is now a mosque. High above the entrance on a stone sundial are the Latin words "Umbra

Sumus", we are shadows. Indeed we are, but the building remains after 250 years.

- Poverty amongst children is the highest in the country

Tower Hamlets still needs the vision of contemporary Christians to be the radicals and reformers of the 21st century. Come and encourage some of the churches committed to London's East End!

The 2021 Virtual Walk around Lambeth, Southwark and the City of London is also on that webpage. The 2021 walk is just as good as the 2020 one but it has only raised £10,500 so far. That is £15,000 less than we usually raise; income we can hardly afford to lose. If you usually support Unlock through the walk, and have not yet done so this year (or even if you have!) please prayerfully consider making a donation to help us deliver Unlock support and resources to the places that need it most.

OUR SECOND VIRTUAL WALK

Due to the 2021 walk again being changed to a Stay at Home walk, we are not able to produce our usual list of church groups who have sent in their sponsorship. However, we are as ever grateful to everyone who either obtained sponsorship or sent a donation. Whilst we do try to acknowledge all donations, if you did not receive your usual letter of thanks then that would have been due to still being part furloughed but needless to say all donations are always very much appreciated. You will read elsewhere that sadly the response was not as good as last year being around £10,500 which is still a substantial sum, and we hope to return to more normal levels next year when we are back to a real walk which I know everyone is so much looking forward to. Special mention must go to the Benefice of Aldermaston & Woolhampton who raised the tremendous sum of £677.45 through online giving in memory of one of their much loved walkers who died during the year.

If you have not seen the virtual walk materials they are still here unlock-urban.org.uk/support_walk.php It comprises 6 sections entitled Patience, Lament, Kindness, Discernment, Gratitude & Hope. Thanks to Ian Smith of the Walk

Planning Team for working so hard to produce the pack including information about the route, church factsheets, reflections, bible texts, Unlock stories, prayers, also the "Thoughts along the River" activities produced by Carolyn Gower (Rotherham worker). We are so looking forward to being able to be back together face to face in 2022.

Online giving is a very easy and efficient way of collecting your sponsorship and with the closure of Virgin Giving we have signed up with Give as you Live. Donate where you will be able to set up your own sponsorship page as Aldermaston & Woolhampton did to enable people you don't see to sponsor you, and also to be able to promote your sponsorship through social media or e-mail. It is very straight-forward to set up and full details are available on our website. Details of all you will need for the 2022 walk including new sponsor forms will be circulated at the end of January, and also published on the website, but if you are using a sponsor form from a previous year please ensure that you send your sponsorship to our new office address – Unlock, 15 Station Road, Rotherham, S60 1HN.

FINANCE

TREASURER'S REPORT 2021

Asking someone "How are you" in the Zulu Language often elicits the response "We are here". The implication is that they are surviving despite what life has thrown at them. The same could apply to Unlock finances. We've had a difficult time financially but we are hanging in there!

We ended 2020 (our last completed financial period) with a significant deficit of £5,775 which

was concerning but better than we had feared earlier in the year. Income was down on the previous year by 12% (£51,337) but our expenditure was also down by 8% (£57,112).

The London Walk donations have always been a significant part of our funding. The Walk Planning Team has done an amazing job producing a virtual walk over the past two years. Both walks were very well-received but the walk

this year (2021) generated a much lower donation income. The shortfall was partially offset by planning a virtual walk from the outset which avoided the cost of printing and posting the guide-maps. We also received a very generous donation (unrelated to the walk) which helped balance out the reduced walk income. We look forward to hundreds of feet pounding the streets of London during a real-life Unlock London Walk in 2022. We hope you can join us!

We've continued to work as efficiently as possible and to keep costs down as much as we can. We've settled into our new office, although we haven't been there very much due to furlough and working from home. We've had to furlough office staff and local workers at various times during the lockdowns. The government Job Retention Scheme has been a useful lifeline making up a significant part of our income during the pandemic.

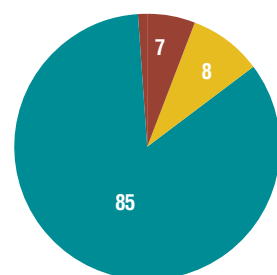

We hope that you will continue to support our work as we get back onto our feet and continue to walk alongside us as we journey forward into the future.

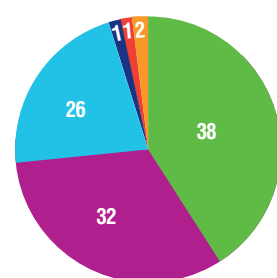

Most Unlock resources are designed for people right on the church fringe and beyond; this one is different. Its aim is to break down barriers between church communities and the communities within which churches are set,

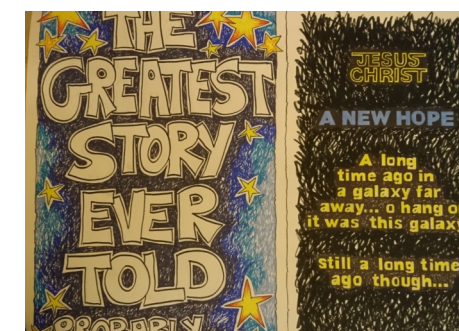


by developing listening and conversation skills in fun ways and in relation to faith and community issues.

but what is giftaid?

Simply, for those of you who have not yet heard of 'Gift aid', it is a system that enables charities to claim an extra 25p from the Inland Revenue for every £1 donated to them by a UK taxpayer.

9 in every 10 donations received by Unlock are NOT made under giftaid.

If you pay tax then please consider whether you can tick the gift-aid box on the registration form when you make your donation.

Giftaid will NOT cost you anything!

All it means is that we can apply to the Inland Revenue for an extra 25p for every £1 that you give towards our work.

To qualify for Gift aid, you must pay enough tax to cover the amount that will be claimed back by the charity/charities that you give to – so if you give £10 you must have paid £2.50 in tax!

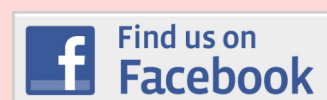
