

2023 UPDATE

Marking Unlock's 50th anniversary has been an opportunity to reflect on what has been achieved and look forward to the future. We were especially privileged to be able to include in our celebration at Liverpool Cathedral some of those who had the vision and tenacity to found EUTP (latterly known as Unlock) in 1972.

One former Chief Executive, Jenny Richardson joined us for the day. Afterwards she kindly sent us her reflections on the conversations she had enjoyed.

As I chatted with some of those at the Unlock 50 year celebration, I was struck by a couple of things:

The first was how people had often found their way into Eutp/Unlock through a personal invitation – someone had asked them (persuaded them?!) to get involved, to take on a particular thing that used their gifts; and, once they were there, they were hooked! Many have continued faithfully in Unlock – sometimes in the more out front roles, often beavering away in the background. A friendship brought them in and friendships they have developed means they are still connected and sometimes active, many years on. Something about being part of Unlock's approach rings a bell; it challenges and nurtures faith.

The other thing that struck me was that Unlock is needed as much now as when EUTP began. The church in the UK, as it continues to reinvent its visions and strategies in mission, still makes assumptions about learning styles and approaches to theology that exclude those from the UK's poorer urban neighbourhoods. Unlock's educational and theological methods remain a vital resource that is missing from the mainstream church – vital for those who live,

work and engage in ministry in our urban communities.

So, alongside many others, I remain grateful to God for all I have gained through my work and friendships with Unlock. And I am grateful to those who are now carrying the baton passed on to them by others. As Unlock enters its 6th decade, every blessing on those who have been faithful for many years, and those who have more recently joined the "Unlockers"!

They didn't want to write, they were embarrassed about writing, and so my challenge was to find a way to run this course without students having to write, and we devised a totally different method of teaching.

Fiona Parker – after the 2007 Hull flooding

Hull has often felt forgotten, there was very little coverage of the extensive bombing of Hull during WWII and locals felt that the 2006/7 flooding in the city got less media attention than more rural areas in the home counties. So the Unlock event that we ran on a housing estate after the floods in Hull, listening to people's flood stories, was called 'Unforgotten'. We provided various activities that encouraged people to share their stories and set them alongside stories in the Bible.

I remember one couple, probably in their 70's, and they were both disabled in different ways and their whole ground floor flat had been absolutely devastated and they had to move out. I remember being very moved by it, because it was just a very safe space for them to talk about what they'd been through. Through sharing they were able to see their

experience in the context of the bigger story of God's people and by the end of the day, nothing had changed, they still had to go back to this flat that wasn't theirs, but just in telling of their story they felt a lot more supported and they felt heard - they weren't forgotten in the whole thing - it was really good.

Rather than see people as empty vessels to be filled with the so called wisdom I'd learnt over too many years in academic institutions, they invited me to see my task as giving people the key to unlock their own treasure chest of wisdom, skills and experience. It was a humbling moment to accept that God was already at work in people's lives and foolish to think that I was taking God to them. My task wasn't to impose a pre-packaged gospel but to help people connect with a God in whose image they were made and whose work they were already doing in building His Kingdom on earth as it is in heaven.

We were making junk models of our community. It had gone really well and then we added ribbons to show the relationship between the different organisations in the community and one person decided to fray the ribbon between



the two churches to show how the relationship had deteriorated over recent years, and this visual picture of that deteriorating relationship was so profound that both those churches put actions in place to try to heal the deterioration in the relationship. I don't think that would have come to surface nearly as quickly without making those junk models. Doing it really practically unlocked something very profound and led to something really positive and important for that community.

I can see them now - these priests stood in a line and I said "we're going to do a scene from the Full Monty". They said "not the last scene". I said "No, not the last scene". But the reaction was so terrific you know and we warmed to each other and we went into discussion groups. And it's that kind of thing that's really made it for me with Unlock - the spontaneity and the freedom to bring your own story into a situation.

Since the challenges of the pandemic years, and the publication of 'The Year We Stayed At Home' we have been reflecting a good deal on the things that bring us joy, the things we love to do, that restore us and refresh us. In spite of a truly generous response to our appeal at the beginning of 2022 funds are still not quite restored sufficiently to allow us to initiate much new work with confidence. Reflect on what it is that you love to spend time doing and give thanks to God for that source of joy in your life.

Examples – fishing, baking/cooking, sewing, sports, mending/fixing, designing, making, hospitality, writing, art, techy stuff, growing things, drama, music, dance.

Decide how you can use that activity just amongst a small group of close family and friends, to raise a small extra donation for Unlock's work.

Act – spend some time doing the thing that you love in order to raise some funds for Unlock.

I used the Unlock approaches in Cambodia because I couldn't speak the language, but I could use creative methods to unlock people's stories. I remember one time, we did the Prodigal Son. I was helping with a Bible study with group of women who worked in the garment factories. I remember telling them the story of when the father lifts up his robes to run, and we were all running across the ground; we were all running and it was a big thing because in that culture to lift up your skirt and show your ankles was really shameful. But yet the father did not give a monkey's, he just ran. In Cambodian culture it's not a big thing, laughing is acceptable but crying is not, but we were all weeping – it just broke something, it was just doing this dramatic act; we're just going to run. Because a lot of them came from quite broken families, and their relationship with their father particularly was quite difficult. I remember that really clearly, that was incredible that time.

This was the first time I had ever done anything like this – using a faith based resource with the general public and I was unsure how it would be

received. What I didn't factor in is how much it would impact on me! By the end of the day I felt so humbled and so rich.

What a beautiful day and such lovely conversations came about while I sat at that Unlock activity table! There was a parent whose child had been asking who Jesus was, a boy who had recently lost his Gran, a woman whose friend had been very ill, a family whose young daughter was so enthralled by this idea of thinking about what brought her joy that she got all the family involved, decorated multiple cards to hang up and really didn't want to go back to the dinosaurs and free fairground rides outside!

As we began to come out of Covid and began to be back in church the resource, The Year We Stayed At Home, proved invaluable in helping us to begin to process what we all had communally been through. I highly commend that resource to you – it's just been so useful and so helpful for us as a church community. As we move forward into the future we are exploring both ways of engaging more deeply as a congregation. The gift to us of Covid has been watching and hearing how much more confident the congregation are at articulating God stuff, and the confidence that people have brought both to the conversations in church – and for those who are natural reflectors and who don't want to articulate to a larger group it's been really interesting in the one to one conversations how you can hear that the thought processes are being stimulated.

THERE IS ALWAYS NEW UNLOCK WORK TO DO AND NEW WAYS TO DO IT

Our Local Partnership Projects are intentionally relatively short term; 2-3 years. Our resources are limited and we want to impact as many different communities as we can reach. Our approach to Bible Engagement is not complicated or difficult and we believe that there are people in every church community who can grasp it and develop the confidence to do it for themselves – so our input is time limited, aimed always at doing ourselves out of a role by enabling others. During the pandemic most of our ongoing local partnerships came to their natural end and with travel and networking so restricted it was not possible to develop the new relationships required to launch new ones.

We put the time to good use though, developing some new Bible Engagement resource packs, which are free to download from our resources page (www.unlock-urban.org.uk/resources_projects.php#bible_study_resources) or available in print on request from the Unlock office.

So now our work in some locations is finished

and in others it is between phases. In Sunderland, for instance, we still have a partnership with North Wearside Parish, where we are providing a training event in 2023 but there are no plans to appoint another Unlock worker there for the time being. In Hull, likewise, we retain good relationships and Unlock work is ongoing on a voluntary basis but there are no plans to employ anyone for the time being, because it's working well without the need to do that.

We have appointed a new Unlock worker in Rotherham. Cameron Carr is a young man, relatively new to following Jesus. He is full of passion for supporting others to grow with

him as he discovers his own calling and faith.

We are currently exploring the possibility of developing new partnership work in the Dingle area of inner city Liverpool. Dingle has high violent crime figures and will be one of the most challenging areas we have ever worked in (although I know there are some in Hull who would dispute that) but we believe that just gives us more scope for making a difference.

We are looking for other new places to establish partnerships and develop work. If you think that your own area, or one known to you, would benefit from Unlock's approach to

TACKLING WITH THE WIND – ADAPTING TO THE TIMES

We have always been fairly creative and flexible in the way that we structure each local partnership to the specific needs of its location but we are now becoming even more so. Our overall input will always be limited by the finance we can draw on but the way we shape each local incarnation of Unlock's work is becoming more and more varied; with the learning cycle (on page 7) and the intent to equip others to use it, being the primary constants in our work. This creativity and flexibility is demanding for such a small organisation, but so rewarding; and it honours our conviction that there is no one size fits all approach to human communities.

We are currently exploring the possibility of some work with one of the national foodbank networks, which would equip some of their staff and volunteers (those who are interested) with

tools for feeding people spiritually as well as physically through their foodbank network. This is a really exciting possibility for Unlock, potentially extending our reach and we'd welcome enquiries from any other organisations which might like to work with us in this way.

We can provide a day training event for groups who want a hands on way of learning about our approach to

And, we're also exploring the possibility of some new work in Billesley Common, Birmingham, possibly linking with a storytelling programme called Truth be Told (<https://truthbetold.org.uk/>)

In all our work we believe in investing quality time in listening and relationship building. It values people and our experience suggests that's an investment well worth making. All these new initiatives are still at the tentative, 'getting to know you' stage and it's too soon to know how far they will develop. Please pray with us that by the time we produce our next newsletter, towards the end of 2023, we have some positive updates for you.

WOOLWICH, ABBEY WOOD AND THE ELIZABETH LINE

THE 40TH UNLOCK LONDON WALK, 22 APRIL 2023

The 2023 Unlock Walk will take place on April 22nd in the Thamesmead, Plumstead and Abbey Wood area, in the boroughs of Greenwich and Bexley and ten miles East of the City of London. We are close to the Thames, which is much wider than in central London, and as we are East of the Thames Barrier the river banks have been built up for flood protection.

This walk has been one of the trickier ones to plan, as the area is split by the railway and some major roads, and also contains the Belmarsh



prison complex and major sewage infrastructure, both of which are obviously off-limits to walkers; but the route manages to weave under or over these obstacles and gives an idea of this very interesting area.

With the opening of the delayed but very impressive Elizabeth Line the area is now much more accessible than ever before, and much of it has seen significant changes since we last walked here in 1998. Thousands of new homes are being built amongst the existing mixture of housing. There are the brutalist 1960's concrete tower blocks of Thamesmead which are set next to cycle paths, streams, lakes and nature reserves, the Victorian terraces of Plumstead, and the redeveloped Georgian buildings of the Woolwich Arsenal - which just over a century ago was one of the largest industrial sites in the world, occupying most of the entire area and employing over 80,000 people. Oldest of all are the ruins of Lesnes Abbey (the Abbey in Abbey Wood) which was built in the 12th century.

The walk takes advantage of the Elizabeth line and we visit a mixture of the local Churches, both old and new, which serve the people of the area. They are looking forward to meeting you!

SIMPLE MATHS

A rising inflation rate means that our costs escalate. Unless our income also increases we will be able to do less of our charitable work.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2022

It was a great relief to reach the end of 2021 (our last completed financial period) with only a modest deficit of just over £1,000. Total income (£47,538) was down on the previous year by 7.4% but our expenditure (£48,602) was also reduced by 14.9%. The previous two years had been very difficult with the effects of the

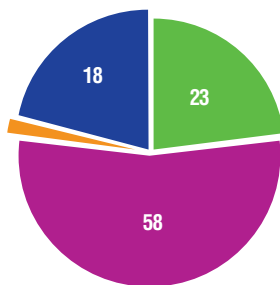
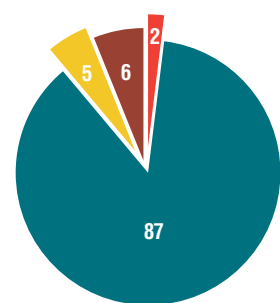
pandemic, the inability to hold our usual London walk on the ground, needing to furlough staff and to reduce our activity. The walk team produced an excellent 2021 virtual walk but it generated a reduced (but still very useful) income of £11K. We are very grateful for our generous donors, who helped make up many of

the losses, and for the government Job Retention Scheme which also provided a useful lifeline.

Huge thanks to everyone who has responded to our funding appeal, launched in the last newsletter, to get us back onto a stable financial footing for the future. The response has been very good. We expect to slightly exceed our £20k target, with the one-off donations and new regular standing orders, by the end of 2022.

The 2022 London Walk was held in April in Tower Hamlets in real space rather than just virtually! The walk was well received with several hundred walkers enjoying the route. Walker numbers were down from previous walks and income (so far) is about £21k.

We'd love you to join us next year... and bring your friends too! Income from the walk has always been an essential part of our funding and the walk is a great day out.

We are now working hard to set-up new local partnerships and are also exploring potential opportunities to work with other organisations. At the moment, we all face rapidly increasing costs and our budget will remain tight for the foreseeable future. We need our faithful supporters now more than ever. We will continue to work as effectively and efficiently as possible and hope that you will continue to support our work.

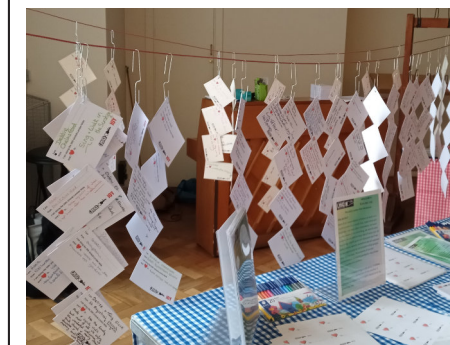

giftaid it

but what is giftaid?

Simply, for those of you who have not yet heard of 'Gift aid', it is a system that enables charities to claim an extra 25p from the Inland Revenue for every £1 donated to them by a UK taxpayer.

9 in every 10 donations received by Unlock are NOT made under giftaid.

If you pay tax then please consider whether you can tick the gift-aid box on the registration form when you make your donation.

Giftaid will NOT cost you anything!

All it means is that we can apply to the Inland Revenue for an extra 25p for every £1 that you give towards our work.

To qualify for Gift aid, you must pay enough tax to cover the amount that will be claimed back by the charity/charities that you give to – so if you give £10 you must have paid £2.50 in tax!

LEADING TO MORE EXPERIENCE
What we learn now is learnt for life and changes us. We also learn to keep reflecting!

Change happens as a result of linking real life experience with the Bible. This change often leads to action among others.

REVEALING GOOD NEWS OF THE DOWN TO EARTH CHRIST
The real life stories are connected to and compared with similar situations in the Bible.

CHAIR'S ANNUAL REPORT



Thank you for being faithful with us for another year – it's helped! And if you are new to this, a very warm welcome: we hope you find a home.

We can say that we know that our times are in God's hands, but we quite often don't behave like they really are. Of course there are other forces at work – we're in the now and the not-yet kingdom; and also, of course, our mistakes have consequences, in spite of the fact that we are forgiven – but with those caveats, does Unlock behave like our times are in God's hands? I hope we do and I'll try to describe why I say that; but I hope you will pray for us that, if I'm right, we keep on that path for the quite difficult times ahead.

One way we try to be trusting is not to keep on asking for money in a pushy 'we're in dire straits (again)' kind of way. So, it was a big decision to make an appeal that said, 'if you don't help, we're toast' – it felt like it was a request made in faith. The response to that appeal has been hugely humbly wonderful. You raised the £20k we needed to repair the walk loss from 2021 and to give us some funds to do a bit more development work out where the need is. We're told we got the letter right; well the reaction suggests we did, and we are so grateful.

Sometimes you don't have any choice but to trust. We knew that if the 2022 walk was not a success, we could not make the same appeal above again – so, we just had to go for it. The effort it takes to put it on is a masterly rather beautiful thing; there is a lot of love and care and grunt goes into organising it. I was there glad-handing, which is the only use I am

in the whole affair, being up in Hull. I really enjoyed it, as I have previously, but maybe there was more of a frisson. We got back to base afterwards: less than 400 walkers when previously there had been over 600. We'd done all we could... so we would have to wait and see. Well the 2022 walk raised as much as we'd hoped it would after a two year hiatus, a good £21k. That's what we needed, that's what we got.

Now, we really want to get on with the work in localities that have taken a real hammering over covid-time. We really want to get our resources back out there under people's noses. We really need our new partnership opportunity with another big national to come good.... not to make us safe and less reliant on God, but to get us into places we haven't been before. We really want to find appropriate ways of responding to where our society is at – Queen Elizabeth's funeral was recently; there is another new Prime Minister; a war that is having and may very well have even more dire consequences; a planet that certainly seems to be under pretty extreme stress – and a church that is saying..... what?

Jesus spoke to people in the thick and grip of extreme privation, oppression, violence and lack of good servant leadership. Our story and Jesus story speak to each other powerfully when we create the right spaces, exercise our faith (i.e. restraint, often) and let the Spirit speak heart to heart.

Once again, thank you for your love, support and prayers.

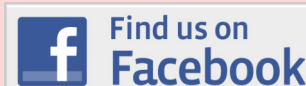
