NOT JUST FOR BIBLE EXPERTS

We have long felt that one of the most significant results of the work we do is the skills that are gained by those we train and employ to work for our Unlock Local Partnerships; skills that they take with them and use in whatever shape their future ministry takes. Almost all go on to leadership roles in churches, both formal and informal.

Unlock Local workers are employed part time for just 2-3 years in a local area, in partnership with churches who want to get better at:

UNLOCKING
real life stories of urban people

REVEALING
Good News of the Down to Earth Christ

RELEASING
life changing skills and confidence

New Unlock workers will learn how to do all that Unlocking, Revealing and Releasing themselves and with others.

You might think that such work would require someone with a theological education, or a mature Christian who knows all about Faith and the Bible. But you would be wrong about that; and our latest work in Rotherham demonstrates this.

When we appointed Cameron in 2022 he was only 19 years old, and he was a relatively new Christian having come to faith in a zoom Bible study group during the Covid Lockdowns during 2020.

Now, being a new Christian doesn't mean you're daft. Cameron is an intelligent, capable and committed young man with innate gifts in facilitation and engaging compassionately with all kinds of people. He is not however, an academic, intellectual type; and when he started his Unlock work he would not have won any prizes for Bible knowledge!

In Unlock Rotherham Cameron has brought together small groups of local people to explore a range of their own experiences and topics of shared interest in relation to stories in the Bible. He has been supported in this by both Unlock staff and members of a local congregation. And together all have grown and learned; discovered how to share personal stories, how to explore the stories in the Bible and what they might mean for living faithfully, and how to take care of one another as we do so. Cameron's presence, in his Unlock role, has acted as a focus and facilitator for both personal and congregational growth. And of course, Cameron has grown too. We will all be watching to see where his future ministry takes him.

At the end of his time with us Cameron said this:



I just wanted to say a huge thank you to the team at Unlock for allowing me to have an amazing year working with Unlock, I have learned and grown so much as an individual but most importantly in my faith.

I heard stories and saw emotions that were unlocked through the events that I held, and connected with people better through our stories.

I have gained skills and knowledge but mainly memories that will be with me forever.

So, if you think that you'd like some Unlock work in your local area, and you think that you maybe don't have anyone with the skills and gifts to manage the work, then think again – you almost certainly do! UNLOCKING REAL LIFE STORIES OF URBAN PEOPLE
Start with the group telling stories from their real life experience.

LEADING TO MORE EXPERIENCE
What we learn now is learnt for life and changes us. We also learn to keep reflecting!

RELEASING LIFE CHANGING SKILLS AND CONFIDENCE
Change happens as a result of linking real life experience with the Bible. This change often leads to action among others.

REVEALING GOOD NEWS OF THE DOWN TO EARTH CHRIST
The real life stories are connected to and compared with similar situations in the Bible.



TRAINING

AN UNLOCK REFLECTIVE ACTIVITY ON THE THEME OF LOSS AND LAMENT



Instructions

Lay the dust sheet on the floor or a row of large tables.

Use the masking tape to write or draw things that people are sad to have lost during the pandemic (or whatever other time of loss you are considering). Press the tape down firmly.

Use the paint, to paint over the masking tape image or words with varied wavy stripes of blue paint. Allow the paint to dry.

Once the paint is dry, remove the masking tape so that the picture or words show up in white.

Continue adding more words and pictures until the sheet is full or no one has anything else they want to add.

I have been involved with Unlock for more than 30 years both as a Worker and as a Trustee so a lot of my style is instinctively Unlock. It has been a real pleasure to introduce each church I have worked with to Unlock materials. Each group has found it empowering to realise that everyone has something to contribute from their

own experience to help unlock the bible for themselves and for others.

Unlock's basic approach has remained the same over the years but the content has developed in exciting ways to make sure the material is always relevant to the world in which we live. Complex issues are explored in a simple and straightforward way that is accessible to all, especially oral learners.

Most recently St Oswald's have used the 'Unlocking Feelings' resource - 6 reflections and activities exploring emotions. The feedback from the groups that used it was that "the studies on emotions were easy to engage with and we all agreed it would be good to use more materials from Unlock Urban in the future". And, "as an outward looking fellowship wanting to get involved with our local community Unlock material really seems to scratch right where we are itching!".

Our 40th walk was linear rather than circular, so that everyone had a chance to travel on the newly opened Crossrail link between Thamesmead and Abbey Wood. About 450 walkers took part and it was lovely for people to be able to sit outside for refreshments at the Unlock base at Emmanuel Baptist Church, with horses in the field opposite. East Plumstead Baptist Church have done well to come top of the "league table" this year, as they not only had enough people to act as one of the checkpoint churches, but were also able to have their usual group of walkers as well, raising a lot more interest in what Unlock is all about. We do, however, appreciate each and every contribution whether through sponsorship or personal donations, whether it be large or small. Some walkers are 40 years older than when they started and are still either walking, have passed the baton on to younger people, or are making

THE 41st UNLOCK LONDON WALK, 27 APRIL 2024

'Our journey continues - please walk with us'

We really hope you will walk with us on Saturday April 27th 2024 - after our easterly journey to Thamesmead last year, can you work out where we're going next year from these way-markers?

We're planning for you to wander by Westfield shopping centre; Wormholt Park; Westbourne Park Road; the Westway; White City and 101 Wood Lane - the BBC Television Centre), Wormwood Scrubs (prison and parkland), and a section of the Grand Union waterway.

The 2024 Unlock Walk is visiting West London! Specifically the London boroughs of Kensington, Chelsea, Hammersmith and Fulham. The area we will explore in the 41st Unlock Walk is a bit further west of where we walked in 2001 and 2005 and south of where we visited in 2012. And going by these dates you'll see an Unlock Walk visit to west London is long overdue!

One area that does overlap with past walks is around Latimer Road and Ladbroke Grove, and Notting Hill Methodist Church will be one of our checkpoint churches. It is twenty three years

since they hosted walkers on our 2001 'Barriers and Bridges' walk. As the nearest place of worship to Grenfell Tower, they are involved, alongside others, in the community's response to the tragic fire that occurred in June 2017. Our walk will take place nearly seven years after the disaster, but the sadness and sense of injustice is still felt deeply.

Notting Hill Methodist and the other churches on the walk are looking forward to Welcoming and introducing you to their vibrant communities - share fellowship with them and hear about how they are sharing in the work of God's love in their multicultural neighbourhoods. And in between the checkpoint churches, weave your way under the elevated Westway motorway and

railway lines, exploring streets you may not normally walk along and discover the home of the Notting Hill Carnival, varied buildings, bustling markets and beautiful parks.

We are looking forward to another special Unlock Walk and we hope you make a date in your diary - Saturday 27th April 2024 - to wander and wonder with us and raise funds to continue Unlock's work.

TREASURER'S REPORT 2023

We ended 2022 (our last completed financial period) with a moderate deficit of just over £2,450. This was despite an excellent response to our funding appeal (raising just over £20K) and a return to a physical walk on the streets of London, which generated income of £21,100. Total income (£55,022) was up on the previous year by 15.7%

but our expenditure (£57,502) was also increased by 18.4%. Our legally required designated-reserve fund lost over £4K in value due to changes in the financial markets.


This year, the 2023 London Walk was held in April and attracted over 450 walkers who enjoyed the 7.5-mile route. Walk income (to date

of writing) is approaching £20k. Why not join us next year, Saturday April 27th 2024, for a great day out, a unique opportunity to visit a variety of churches and also support the work of Unlock? Bring your friends too!

We continue to seek to establish new local partnerships with churches and explore new ways to work with other organisations. It is not proving easy! Several churches continue to use our free online resources but many are still in survival mode after the pandemic and are not yet ready to embark on new projects. Most churches are feeling the effects of the financial crisis, often with reduced numbers after Covid and are, of necessity, reducing (or ceasing) their financial support for organisations like Unlock. As always, we limit our expenditure as much as possible but costs continue to rise rapidly with no signs of slowing down. Our current budget suggests that we will end 2023 with a significant deficit of several thousand pounds. The exact level of this will depend on the generosity of our supporters.

Thank you for your generosity, which provides the lifeline that keeps us working. We are very grateful for your ongoing support and hope that you will continue to support our work and tell others about Unlock.

A note from our current treasurer

I've been Unlock Treasurer since 2011 and reluctantly, due to health issues and other commitments, feel that it is time for a change. It is an enjoyable way to support Unlock's ministry, mainly from the comfort of your own home, and isn't particularly onerous. The nitty-gritty parts (book-keeping, bill paying, payroll, gift-aid etc.) are all done by Unlock office staff. My main role is to have oversight of the financial position based on the financial reports that the

office sends each month. Each council meeting (three times per year) requires a Treasurer's report plus a brief report for the annual newsletter. The official annual accounts are produced by a paid accountant/independent examiner and checked by the Treasurer before approval by the Trustees. The Treasurer also supports the office staff and chief officer to produce the budget for approval by council.

Most communication is by email and so it is not necessary to live near Rotherham. Attendance at council meetings is important but

travel expenses are reimbursed. There is no need to be a financial expert, although some knowledge of small charity and business finance is useful. There is a monthly monitoring exchange of e-mails.

The job description is available from the office on request and the current treasurer is very happy to discuss the role if you think this may be a role for you.

giftaid it
but what is giftaid?

Simply, for those of you who have not yet heard of 'Gift aid', it is a system that enables charities to claim an extra 25p from the Inland Revenue for every £1 donated to them by a UK taxpayer.

9 in every 10 donations received by Unlock are NOT made under giftaid.

If you pay tax then please consider whether you can tick the gift-aid box on the registration form when you make your donation.

Giftaid will NOT cost you anything!

All it means is that we can apply to the Inland Revenue for an extra 25p for every £1 that you give towards our work.

To qualify for Gift aid, you must pay enough tax to cover the amount that will be claimed back by the charity/charities that you give to – so if you give £10 you must have paid £2.50 in tax!

CHAIR'S ANNUAL REPORT

In reviewing the content of this newsletter, which is principally a report of what we have been doing in 2023, what struck me was how much we 'wanted'.

We want new places with new local partners where we can work together in learning how to apply Unlock's principles. Where any person's life story, any person's or community's grief, or shame or troubles, can be felt, seen and heard by a local body of Christ. A group of Christians who listen, see and feel, in encounters that are somehow like those described in the deeply moving encounters that the gospels record.

We want partners who enable us to reach out and into churches that we just have the resources to get to so as to offer training, free resources on the website... and maybe in time, a local Unlock worker on the ground in a particularly needful locality. We should note that we do have two new National partners this year, Urban Expression and Church Urban Fund. They are very different from us and from each other, but all of us are about how to create, support and resource local churches and local work in financially deprived and 'edge' places... in effective mission; mission which changes lives and the circumstances around our lives; mission which is both 'spiritual' and practical.

We want greater fruitfulness for our London walk both in terms of the income it generates and the impact it has on walkers and the local churches that they visit as they move around a part of London.

And **we want to renew our governance**; to relieve David our treasurer of a responsibility he needs to relinquish; and replace Kath and others in previous years who have had to resign as trustees. We are not without committed and able trustees, but we need more, and we need one to be our treasurer.

Years and years now of austerity, and frankly, decline of the Christian community in terms of numbers and, I guess, giving power, means that life for many church-related organisations is very difficult. Unlock, small and lean as it is, has done pretty well with your prayerful and financial support. But we are struggling to redevelop our work post-covid.

So, please pray with and for us and the **'wanted list'** above. Of course we need money, but we need even more significant shifts than that – we need new and deep friendships, connections and partnerships; new opportunities to share good news; we need a release of the abundance of the kingdom of heaven. Please pray with us, as part of Unlock, for these things.
