









The Roundhouse, Chalk Farm

The Roundhouse was built in 1847 for the London and Birmingham Railway, with a turntable for engines. However, the increasing size of locomotives meant that it became redundant, and it was derelict for many years. Now it has become one of London's leading cultural locations, as a theatre and music venue.

Prisons

estate on the

Pentonville Prison on the Caledonian Road was built in 1842, and at the time was considered as a model prison building - many others copied its design. In the first half of the 20th century hangings were carried out there, the most famous being that of Dr. Crippen. It currently houses medium risk male prisoners. Slightly further North, Holloway prison, constructed in 1850 but completely rebuilt in the 1970's and 80's, is for women and young offenders.

Caledonian Market and Park

The park is on the site of what was once London's cattle market, which was opened in 1855, when the City of London decided to remove live cattle from Smithfield, and cattle could be brought here conveniently by rail. On busy days over 15,000 animals were traded. In 1834, the site was the rallying area for a march of 30,000 trade unionists in support of the Tolpuddle Martyrs. The market closed in 1963, leaving only the 151 ft, high clock tower which had been the centrepiece of the market, and the area was divided up between the park and social housing.

In 1812, the Regent's Canal Company was formed, and in 1820 the canal was completed, but the invention of the railways nearly brought ruin. However, the canal recovered, even carrying ice from Norway to Carlo Gatti's ice house - now home to the London Canal Museum. There are still ramps in the canal to help horses which bolted due to the noise from the trains to get back to dry land. Commercial traffic of bulk goods such as coal and timber continued up to the winter of 1962-3, when the canal was frozen for so long that goods had to go by road instead, and never came back.

Kings Cross Redevelopment

The area North of Kings Cross went from farmland to a major industrial and railway centre in the mid 19th century, but by the late 20th century much of the area had become chemically contaminated and semi-derelict with the decline of the railways and the domestic use of coal. After a decade of planning it is now being redeveloped, with a new postcode (N1C) and many new structures alongside renovated Victorian industrial premises.

Camden Market

Although the nearby Inverness Street Market has been around for over a century, the famous Camden markets only started in 1975, but have now become some of the

Kentish Town

The most widely accepted explanation of the name of Kentish Town is that it derived from 'Ken-ditch' meaning the 'bed of a waterway'. Kentish Town was originally a settlement along the river Fleet which flowed through the area, and today runs underground, entering the Thames by Fleet Street. It is first recorded during the reign of King John (1207) and probably its most famous resident was Karl Marx.
