# **WELCOME TO UNLOCK WALK 36 SHINING A LIGHT**

The idea behind our title for the walk was not just because we had two churches with "light" references - the Lantern Methodist Church in Raynes Park and the Lighthouse Church not far away in West Barnes. I used to live close to the Lantern Church, so I know how this church works hard at bringing Christ's light into people's lives, both their congregation and the community around them; and it does not take a visitor long to recognise the light that clearly shines through the Lighthouse Church, too.

The theme of light also has its origins in the passage from Luke 8:16-17, "No one lights a lamp and hides it in a clay jar or puts it under a bed. Instead, they put it on a stand, so that those who come in can see the light. For there is nothing hidden that will not be disclosed, and nothing concealed that will not be known or brought out into

So, the Raynes Park Community Church nestled on the edge of the "Apostles" (the local name for the row of twelve streets here) reveals this light with its Saturday café, where openness and welcome can change people's lives. At the other end of the Kingston Road is the Wimbledon Salvation Army whose Faith in Action Homeless Drop-In seeks to answer both parts of Luke's text. The Salvation Army's work is just as important now as it was back in its founding years, and the voice for those who are most vulnerable is still centred in the need to let everyone see that light. Which takes us to the YMCA where we learn how its Christian origins are still at the heart of all it does. The chaplains here are part of this Christian core; there to serve the community as a whole. They too are responding to the challenge in Luke's text.



When we visit St John the Divine, we will see that this church serves a wide range of people, including the large estate next door. They also serve another estate across the River Wandle from the path we take south, and the Deen City Farm is a great resource we pass, just across the bridge from

Further on is Morden Baptist church, whose warm welcome is matched by a strong commitment to serving the needs of the vulnerable in their local community. Their refurbished frontage makes it clear that they want to be part of Morden's daily life and their light clearly shines here.

In contrast, St John Fisher RC church seems to be tucked away in a quiet suburban location, the newest church on our walk (apart from the YMCA chapel), yet it serves an area twice the size of the route we are walking today, and this is partly why it is such a busy place of worship. This church, like all of the others, is proof that the light is not being kept in a jar in this area, and every church is committed to serving that truth we know as the light.

## **GETTING THERE**

As usual walkers are encouraged to start anywhere and go either way, to avoid a bulge at checkpoints. The area is well served by public transport; the walk route actually passes two underground stations, two national rail stations and two Tramlink stops. There are direct services on the Northern Line from Edgware and High Barnet in the north, and by Tramlink from Beckenham in the east. Thameslink offer connecting services from many points outside London, and trains from the south-west serve Raynes Park and Wimbledon stations. The area is served by 19 bus services from different parts of southwest London.

London buses and trams are cashless. You will need a Bus Pass, a Travelcard, an Oyster Card or a Contactless Payment Card.

An adult single bus or tram journey on Oyster or contactless card is charged at £1.50 (one change of bus allowed) and multiple bus journeys are capped at £4.50.

For a mixture of bus. tram and train journeys paid with an Oyster or contactless payment card, daily capping works out cheaper than buying a Day Travel Card.

Travelcards are available from tube/rail stations.

There is free on-road parking on Saturdays in residential roads around much of the periphery of the route and in the vicinity of most of the checkpoints, but not A and G.

## NHEELCHAIR USERS

Sadly, yet again several of the stations in the area of the walk are not wheelchair-friendly. There is step-free access to all the platforms at Wimbledon Station including District Line and Tramlink. There is step-free access at Morden (Northern Line) but not at South Wimbledon. Tramlink has step-free access to the trams at all stops. At Raynes Park station there is a long steep ramp down from the inbound (eastbound) platform but no equivalent access for westbound trains.

The whole route is pretty flat apart from a climb (either way) to cross the railway bridge at South Merton. If you go clockwise there is a small up-kerb at the Phipps Bridge Tramlink crossing. Across Morden Hall Park to Merton Abbey Mills the path is either metalled or compacted gravel. There's a rough bit just near the Mills, but you could divert through the Mills across the water. To avoid this stretch completely see the note above "for the footweary".

One stretch at Cannon Hill Common is unsuitable for wheelchairs. The alternative road route goes over Cannon Hill. To avoid this use the quarter-hourly 413 bus service.

Clockwise: Stop H "Northway" (outside checkpoint C) to St John Fisher Primary School, then go north along Grand Drive to rejoin the walk route at Crossway

Anti-clockwise: Divert southwards at Grand Drive to catch the bus outside St John Fisher Primary School. Alight at Stop J "Cherrywood Lane" near to checkpoint C.

**Note:** The toilet at **checkpoint F** is not wheelchair accessible.
